

# SHORT STORY SUMMARY

## SHORT STORY SUMMARY





### CHARACTER FOCUS

Her morals and values stay the same, plus she seems to vastly follow the crowd to avoid taking any unnecessary risks.






#### BEGINNING: SUPEREGO/EGO

Liz has some doubts in her mind about the government when she says: "I just don't understand the delay - we've been wearing the masks for weeks already, they should have delivered a new movie by now" (Valentine 2). This is her id questioning the government's actions, but it's quickly overtaken by her superego because instead of discussing this concern more, she moves past it and brushes it off as that "the government wasn't above a little mistake" (Valentine 2).





Through this interaction at the beginning, we can see that at this point, Liz's instincts or id are telling her that something is wrong, but her moral conscience or superego is to follow the rules like everyone else, which she does without difficulty at the beginning since her ego shuts down her id easily.


#### MIDDLE: ID

After the initiating event when the musical/movie is hacked to display messages saying that the disease doesn't exist and the government is lying, Liz's psychological state shifts because she is now less sure about who to believe. Her unsureness can be seen with the quote: "Liz hoped this kid was lying" (Valentine 3). The beginning of her reflection and serious doubt can be portrayed when "she thought, annoyed, about the stupid paper mask she wore three days a week when the Pathogen Alert was high" (Valentine 3).



The annoyance that Liz shows in this moment is the first sign of her id or natural instincts showing through, which are to question and criticize what the government is making them do. By the middle of the story because of the messages that John Doe displayed on the screen, Liz begins to actually think about whether or not it makes sense. Her psychological state is therefore weakened because she is now faced with conflict.


#### MIDDLE: EGO





In the middle of the story, Liz sees a video which said: "It's easy to be a good citizen!" and "We need what you know" (Valentine 6). Although her superego would tell her that it's the right thing to be a good citizen and report him, the desire of her id tells her to help John Doe.





Overall, she decides not to tell the authorities about John Doe, which is a decision from her ego because it is a compromise between helping his cause like she would want to, and turning him in which is what she sees as the morally responsible thing to do.



### END: SUPEREGO



Liz encounters John Doe again as a Disease Control agent and he mentions to her that he was going to showcase the true intentions of the government to the whole entire country. He also asks her to join him but right away her superego takes full control as she hesitates to join him to spread that message. Despite the fact that she was being pressured by him: "How can you be such a coward?" (Valentine 7). She sticks to her superego and doesn't change her mind to revolt, since she wants to stay truthful to the government.

#### END: SUPEREGO



At the end of the short story, we continue to see the strong influence Liz's superego has on her. This psychosexual development has essentially been created due to the harsh control the government has on her and every other citizens in that society. If she were to follow through with her id thoughts, then the consequences wouldn't be in her favour. Despite the fact she probably doesn't want to marry Greg due to him being gay, she doesn't want to risk it so she asks him to marry her: "Want to get married?" (Valentine 9). He says yes and they quickly get married that same day.

#### EGO



Liz's ego was mostly overshadowed by her superego, but through the progression of the story, she was able to make the decision not to tell the authorities that she had encountered John Doe, using her ego. This isn't Liz taking action against the government as it's more general compassion, so it still shows that they have manipulated and controlled her to the point where she will not get involved herself.

## SUPEREGO



Despite the fact that Liz has the desire to rebel against the government and even has her id question some of their motives. All throughout the short story, her superego stops her from betraying the government or acting on her id. This shows how much control the government has on its citizens. It also demonstrates that the superego instinct may or may not be a good choice because in this case nothing changed in that society and all of the citizens are still suffering immensely by the controlling environment in the end.







Liz's id, or natural instincts in the story are to rebel against the government and help John Doe. This reveals that the story is about a dystopian society that has manipulated citizens into pushing these thoughts out of their minds, but the fact that Liz's id is negative towards the government is very telling about the true nature being sinister since that is what she is feeling naturally.

#### CHARACTER'S CONFLICTS

Her id being negative thoughts about what they are doing shows that it is a harmful environment that is making people upset, but also making them feel threatened enough to develop a superego that favours the government.
