- 3. How would you answer King's question, "Do the stories we tell reflect the world as it truly is?"
- 4. After hearing this story, how would you define what a story is?
- 5. Thomas King recounts his personal narrative of his mother working her way through the aerospace industry where she fought against gender discrimination and racism. Think about your family's story, is there a comparable story?
- 6. How does Thomas King compare Indigenous oral traditions & creation stories to the creation story told in the bible? Use point form evidence from the story to fill out the T chart below.
