AGE RANGES

 According to the Factory Act of 1833, there was to be no workers under 9 years old. Children aged 9-13 were to work no more than 9 hours per day and peoples aged 13-18 were to work no more than 12 hours per day. Research shows that most children working in the mining and textile industries were over the age of 15.An average of 12.5% children were under the age of 15.
