How to become a Crime Scene Investigator

### My Career Goals

- I want to become a Crime scene investigator by 2023
- To get there, I will need to:
  - Graduate high school by June of 2020
  - I would have to complete an Associate of fine arts degree with a specialization in criminology which would take about 2 years
  - I would then transfer to UVic to get a diploma in social sciences which would take about eight months
  - Complete A three- to six-month police training program is provided.
  - This would take about 3 years and it would be around the year of 2023

## What is a crime scene investigator?

Crime scene investigators are people that collect evidence at the scene of the crime and preform scientific and technical analysis in labs or offices.

- All crime scene investigators prepare written reports that talk about their findings and investigative methods
- Crime scene investigators must be able to explain their reports to lawyers, detectives, and other law enforcement officials
- Crime scene investigators may be called to testify in court about their findings and methods

### About my future career

- This job is generally done at the crime scene, lab or in an office depending on what you are doing that day
- The salary range in BC for this job is \$40,127 \$93,901
- This is a on call job and there are no specific times that you get off of work and the number of hours per week can vary

### My job has a 33.6% chance of becoming automated

- You have to be able to notice and study the specific details around you

### The training/education required for my career is:

- Completion of a college program or university degree in law and security, criminology, or in the social sciences is usually required.
- A three- to six-month police training program is provided.
- Physical agility, strength, fitness and vision requirements must be met, and psychological or other tests may also be required.

## I intend to go to Douglas College for that career

- Douglas College is located in Vancouver BC, Canada
- I would take the Associate of Arts (criminology) program
- This would take about 2 years
- I would need a degree in this area and a diploma in social sciences if I was to continue and go into University of Victoria

The total cost if I go to Douglas College and University of Victoria would be about \$16,584


I am going to pay for my program:
